Nutrition Program

Conducted the 2022 Nutrition Month Forum: *New Normal na Nutrition, Sama-samang Gawan ng Solusyon!* (July 14, 2022)

Attended by Sangguniang Panlalawigan and Chairman on Committee on Health and Sanitation Hon. Emmanuel Joselito Añes and Sangguniang Bayan Members and Representatives, partner agencies and offices – DILG, DepEd, OPA, PVET, PPDO, PBO, PSWDO, and IPHO.

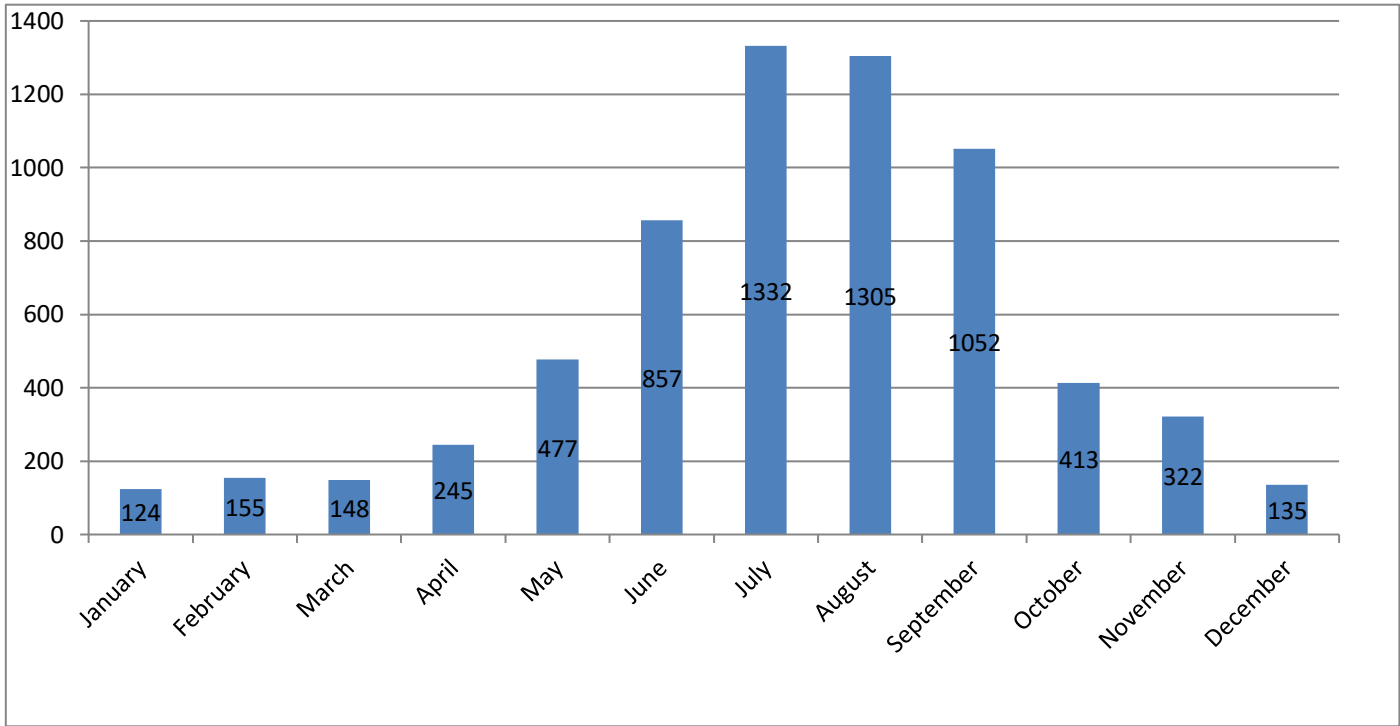


Figure 1. Monthly reported dengue suspect cases in 2022.

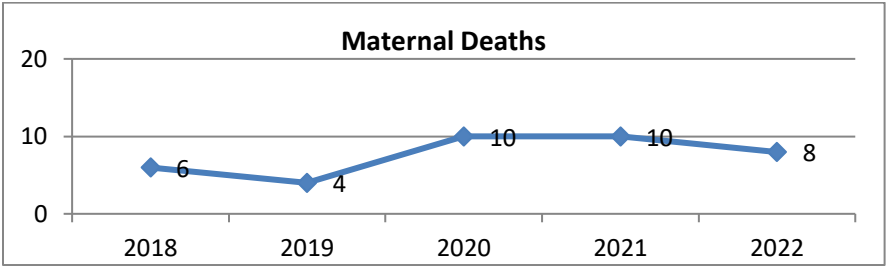

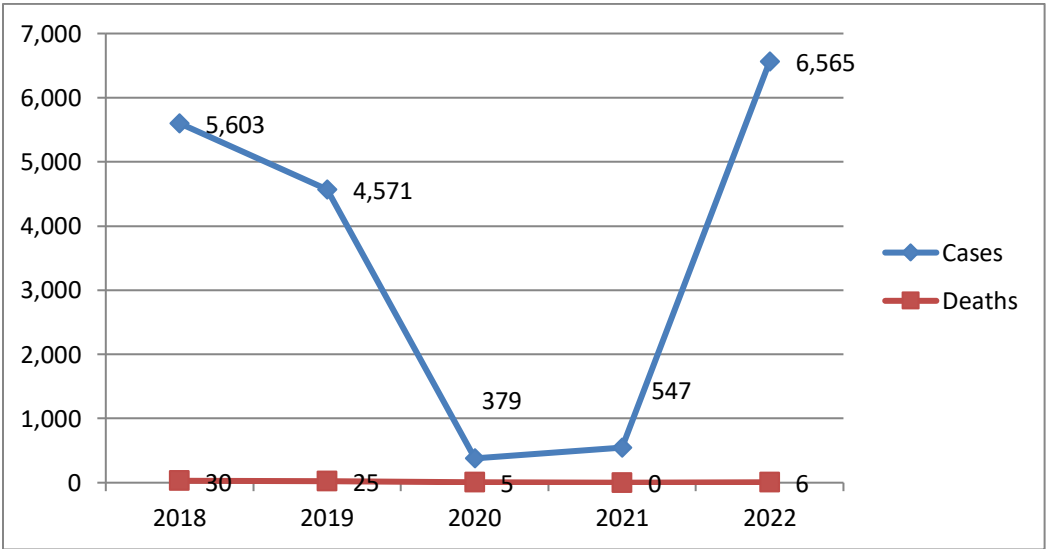

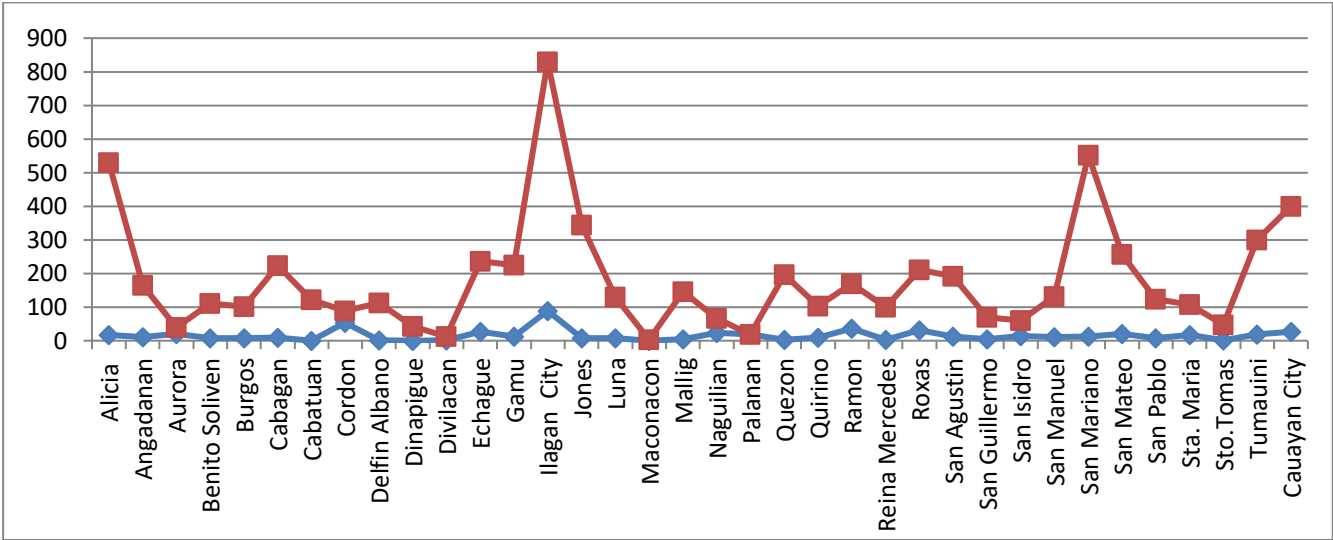

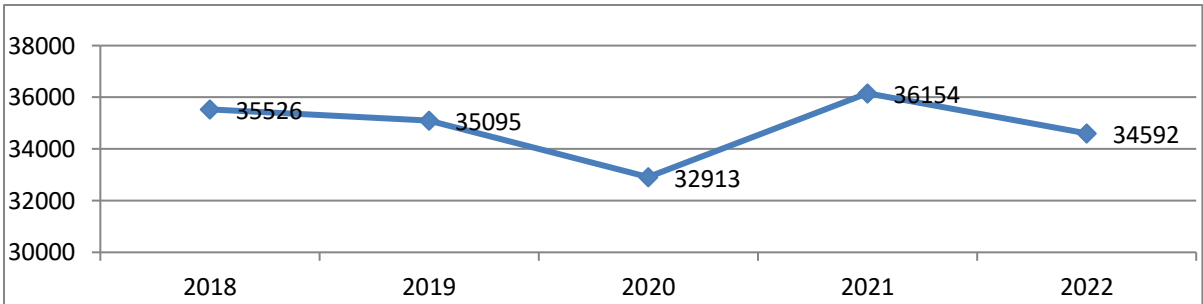

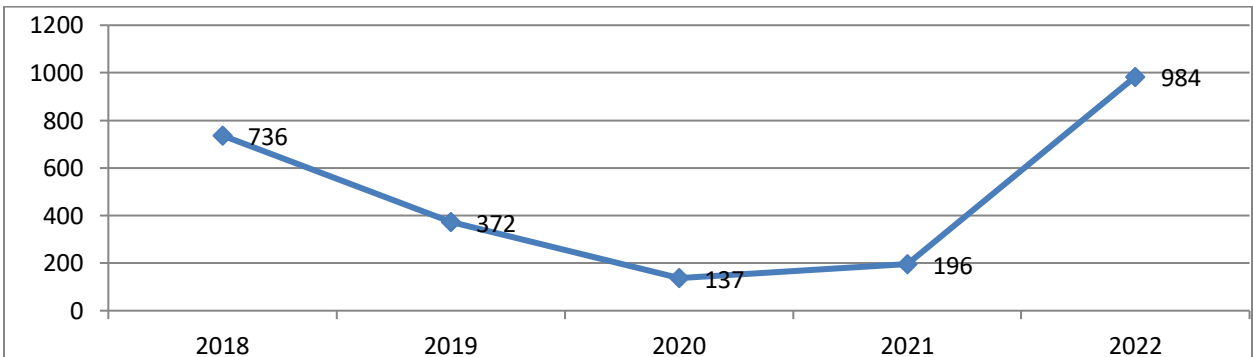

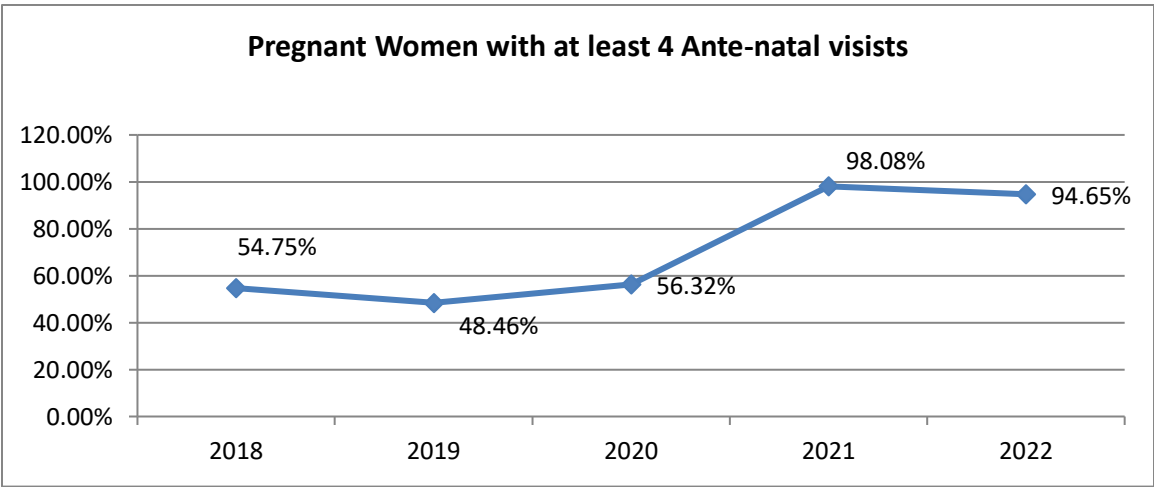

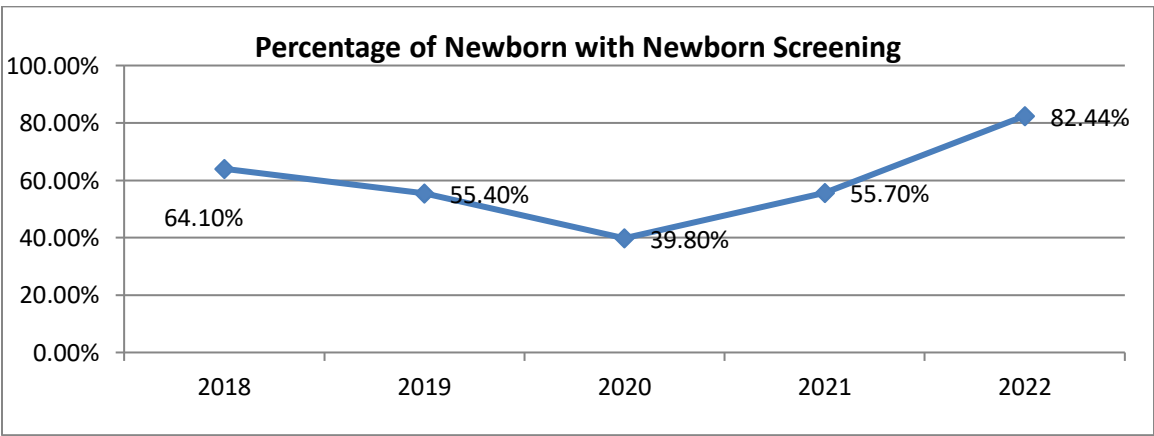

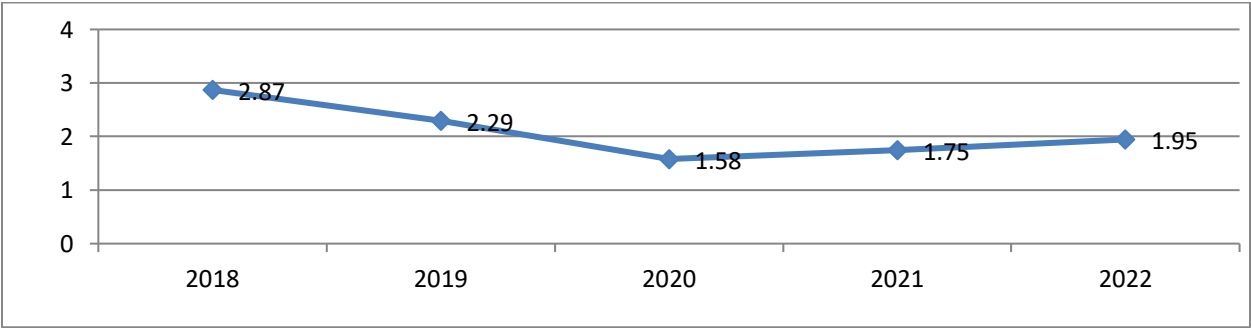

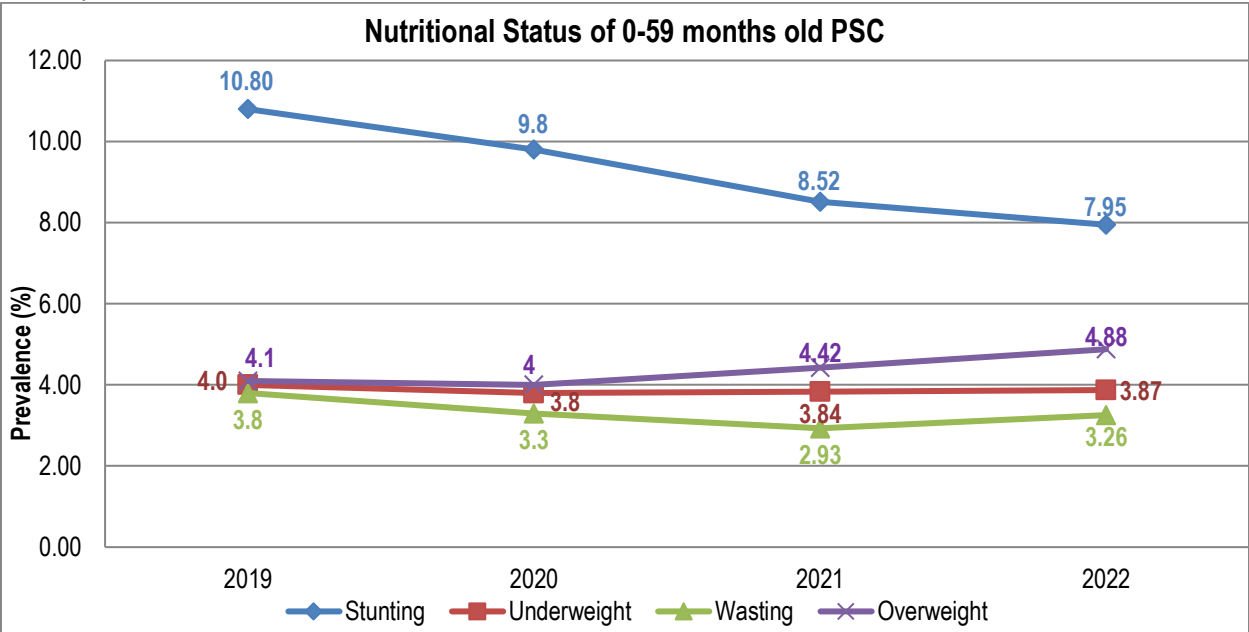

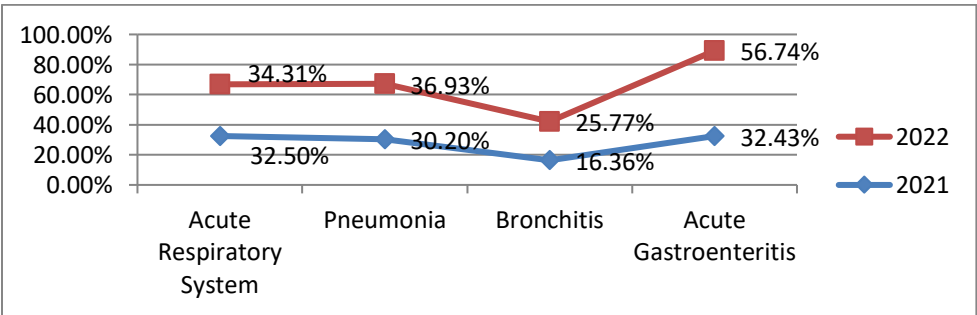
