INTRODUCTION

Pursuant to RA 7160, Section 17, the provision of basic social welfare services is vital in uplifting the living conditions and improving the quality of life of the poorest sector of the population to enable them to become self reliant and contribute to national development, hence the state is committed to the care, protection and rehabilitation of that segment of the country's population that has the least in life in terms of Physical, Mental, and social well-being as well as social welfare assistance and social work intervention, to restore normal functioning and participation in community development.

Inspired by the above-cited law which serve as the agency's functional statement, the Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office (PSWDO) continuously perform its mandate to uplift the well being of the disadvantaged sector through the various programs and services, to wit;

Children Welfare

Children in the day care centers provincewide are continuously provided with opportunities for growth and development amid covid-19 pandemic.

As part of the DSWD's contribution to the Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) program of the government and Republic Act 11037 institutionalizing a National Feeding Program for undernourished children in public Day Care, Kindergarten and Elementary Schools, the Department continuous to implement its Supplemental Feeding Program (SFP), which is the provision of snacks and hot meals in addition to the regular meals to children currently enrolled in child development centers and supervised neighborhood play.

Play Equipments and Indoor and Outdoor sports facilities were provided to Isabela School for the Deaf (ISD) while the Play area of the Provincial Evacuation Center was filled with play equipments, sports facilities, Learning & manipulating materials and audio visuals purchased out of the LCPC Funds

Women Welfare

The kalipunan ng Liping Pilipina (KALIPI) is a peoples organization of women initiated by DSWD. The KALIPI in Isabela is a strong partner of the Isabela Green Ladies Organization (IGLO). The IGLO-KALIPI is continuously supported by the Provincial Government of Isabela in their advocacy to uplift the poor economic condition of the marginalized women through provision of various training for livelihood and income generating projects to capacitate them to become productive citizens.

Before the end of CY 2020 the Association of IGLO-KALIPI in the eleven (11) municipalities left in CY 2019 for TESDA & ISU-Echague skills training on rug sewing and production were already trained and are now gaining income. The fund utilized for the training and sewing machines provided through from the PGI-GAD Fund while other expenses relative to the activity were counterpart of MLGU.



Youth Welfare

The Unlad Kabataan Program of the DSWD is geared towards the total development of the disadvantaged youth in terms of physical, psychological, emotional, social, spiritual, cultural and economic.

The goal is to promote the development of out-of-school youth and other disadvantaged youth to become self-reliant, economically productive, socially responsible citizens and able to contribute to the development of their family and community.

During the 1st quarter of the year, the officers of the PYA-OSY Association in the province were given orientation on the Unlad Kabataan Program. It was stressed herein, the programs and services of the DSWD and the Provincial Government of Isabela for OSY.

On the other hand, the PGI continuously provide for its 1/3 counterpart for the care and maintenance of CICL under the custody of the two (2) residential care facilities in the region, the Regional Rehabilitation Center for Youth (RRCY) in Roma, Enrile and Bahay Pag-Asa in Cauayan City.



PWD Program

The comprehensive program for Persons with Disabilities aims to promote services to all types of PWD 0-59 years of age and are members of the self-help groups of PWDs. The program focuses on areas of disability prevention, rehabilitation and equalization of opportunity.

To support the program, the PGI is continuously providing assistive devices to every deserving PWD client referred by the MLGU for the needed device with below summary;

The annual celebration of the National Disability Prevention and Rehabilitation Week (NDPR Week) was observed this year through provision of Educational/Learning Kits for PWD children at 50 kits per municipality while all officers of the association and indigents PWDs at

the municipal level were provided with packs containing relief packs, blankets and vitamins with a total of 1,500.



The **CHILDREN INTERNATIONAL PHILIPPINES (CIPI) – Free Wheelchair mission** also supports our province by providing assistive devices to less fortunate Persons with Disabilities.



Elderly Program

With the continuous support and assistance of the Provincial Government of Isabela, the Federation of Senior Citizens Association of the Philippines (FSCAP) – Isabela Chapter and Isabela Senior Citizen Organization (ISCO) have achieved its objectives and aspirations. Many things had been accomplished through the cooperation of the thirty-six (36) senior citizen chapters headed by their FSCAP Presidents and Office of the Senior Citizens Affairs (OSCA) Heads. They are encouraged and empowered to undertake projects that would improve community well-being. They also showcase their best practices in their respective

municipality/city. They continuously provide enthusiasm, hope and commitment to the cause of senior citizens in Isabela, hence inspiring every chapter to extend valuable contribution as a resource in the community. The PSWD ensures the smooth operation of the Center by providing them a venue that is conducive and comfortable to stay in while having a cup of coffee and preparing their needs for the regular meeting.

Assistance Provided to Elderly for CY 2020

Provision of Vitamin – C Supplement, Alcohol and Handsoap to all Senior Citizen's Centers to the thirty-six (36) municipalities and cities of Isabela.



Recognizing the importance of Centenarian in the province, there were twelve (12) Isabeleño – Centenarian who were awarded with cash gift. Seven (7) of them were extended with ₱10,000.00. Upon approval of the Governor, HON. RODOLFOT T. ALBANO III of the increase of Centenarian incentive, five (5) of them received an amount of ₱100,000.00.

Administrative Code of 1991 mandates the DSWD to provide a balanced approach to welfare whereby the needs and interest of the population are addressed not only at the outbreak of crisis but more importantly at the stage that would inexorably lead to such crisis. The Provincial Government of Isabela thru the Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office, as the welfare arm of the government, provide immediate and appropriate interventions to help individuals and families cope with social, psychological, physical and economic problems arising from crisis situations.




