#### **INTRODUCTION**

Pursuant to RA 7160, Section 17, the provision of basic social welfare services is vital in uplifting the living conditions and improving the quality of life of the poorest sector of the population to enable them to become self-reliant and contribute to national development, hence the state is committed to the care, protection and rehabilitation of that segment of the country's population that has the least in life in terms of Physical, Mental, and social well-being as well as social welfare assistance and social work intervention to restore normal functioning and participation in community development.

In the past two years, the country was stricken by a deadly pandemic affecting the lives of many people. It cannot also be denied that there were several Isabelinos who suffered from displacement from work and employment. The pandemic brought financial and emotional predicaments that social welfare programs are very imperative. It is to be noted that the strong collaboration of the Local Government Units, the National Government Agencies and other reliable partners succeeded in providing the needed services and programs of the constituents especially the disadvantaged sectors.

Consonant to the Department's Vision, Mission and Goal, various programs, projects and activities under the social welfare sector were smoothly implemented for Fiscal Year 2022.

## V. Family Welfare Program

This program is intended to assist socially disadvantaged families to develop their capability in defining needs and formulating solutions to bring about desired social changes.

The provincial government of Isabela through the office of the Provincial Social Welfare and Development is regularly conducting parent effectiveness/parenting responsibility trainings under the GAD Plan and Budget to service providers primarily to provide expansion of knowledge and skills of parents and caregivers in the barangays to respond to parental duties

and responsibilities on the areas of early childhood development, behavior management of younger and older children, husband and wife relationship, home management and other challenges of parenting including basic hygiene against covid 19 pandemic.

There were three(3) batches of service parents trained this year on the Enriched Parent Effectiveness Service held at Hotel Mills and Rain, namely;

- 1<sup>st</sup> Batch – Child Development Workers
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Batch – C/MSWDO Staff
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Batch – Barangay VAW Desk Officers



The provincial government of Isabela celebrated the Family Week with patients admitted at the GFND Memorial Hospital by providing every patient with Family Food Packs. The activity aims to recognize importance of family bond even in crisis situation.



## VI. Crisis Intervention/Quick Response

Crisis Intervention or Quick Response is to provide a comprehensive and integrated program for the rescue, protection and provision of immediate financial, material, physical, psychological and legal services to individuals and families in crisis situation, including disaster victims.

The PSWDO is mandated to contribute to better and improved quality of life for the citizenry. Priority attention shall be given to the poor, vulnerable and marginalized sectors of the society, hence, it implements social welfare, social protection and anti-poverty programs, projects and services such as the assistance to individuals in Crisis Situation (AICS), among others.

## VII. Supplementary Milk Feeding Program

Under Section 2 of the Philippine Constitution recognizes the vital role of the youth in nation building and shall promote and protect their physical, moral, spiritual, intellectual and total well-being in recognition of the demonstrated relationship between food and nutrition, and capacity of students to develop and learn.

In spite of the feeding program for children of the National Government, the Provincial Government of Isabela through the leadership of the Honorable Governor Rodolfo T. Albano insisted to also include milk feeding to help the young children attain the recommended value of calcium, protein and vitamins to make them strong, active and healthy so as not to affect their learning capacity.

The Program aims not only to improve help condition of children nutritionally but also to support livelihood project of local dairy farmers were milk feeding comes from.

**VIII. Enhance Comprehensive Local Integration Program (ECLIP)**

## IX. Indigenous Peoples Program

The program aims to promote all the rights of Indigenous Cultural Communities/Indigenous Peoples (ICCs/IPs) within the framework of national unity and development and all shall protect the rights of IPs to their ancestral domains to ensure their economic, social and cultural well-being and to recognize the inherent rights of ICCs/IPs.

The Provincial Government of Isabela (PGI) has been and continuously supporting the basic needs of IP families especially children. The PGI, in recognition of IPs inherent rights provided sustainable livelihood for IP families as stated in the PGI's Social Development Plan (SDP) for the Ilagan-Divilacan Road Rehabilitation Project Aside from the livelihood projects that were provided previously, the following were also extended;

- Provided supplies to children in the IP communities of the four (4) coastal areas including San Pablo, City of Ilagan and Tumauini, Isabela
- Conducted Responsibility Parenting session among IP couples in the IP communities of the City of Ilagan
- Extended Cash Assistance and Family Food Packs to IP Leaders
- Provided Family Food Packs and Milk Feeding to Indigenous families of the City of Ilagan, San Pablo, Tumauini, Dinapigue and Divilacan




