Monitoring of Temporary Treatment and Monitoring Facilities (TTMF): April 2022

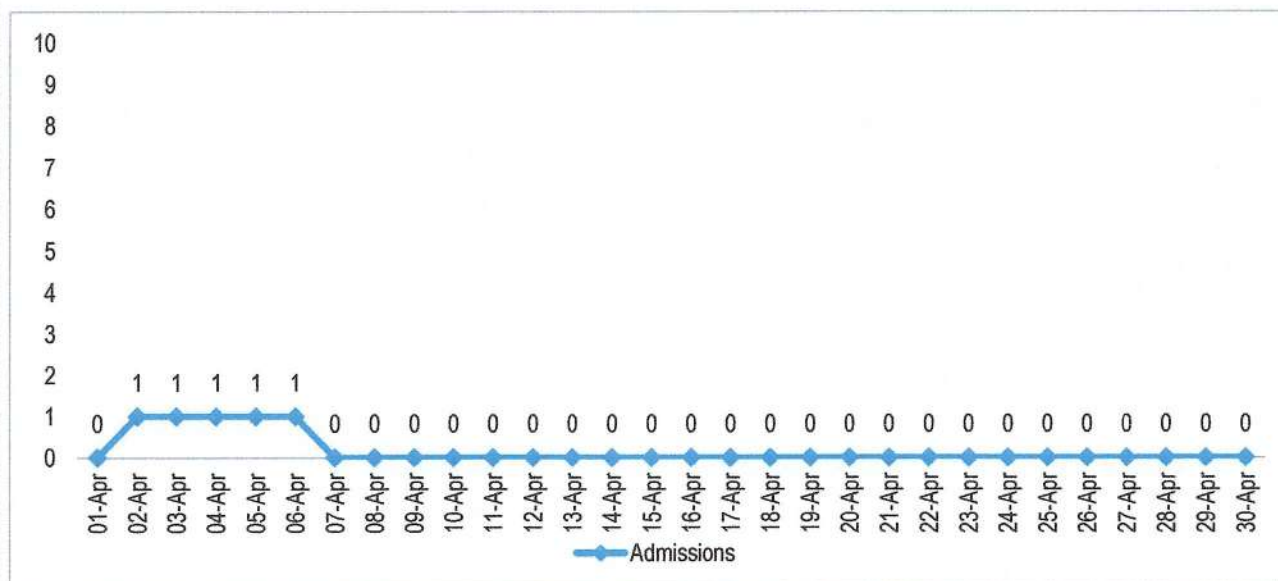

Conduct of National Vaccination Days (*Chikiting Bakunation Days*) for Catch-up Immunization (April 28-29, 2022)

This is to intensify demand generation specifically to infants ages 0-23 months who missed their routine immunization schedule. This 2-day monthly activity will last for three (3) months from April to June every last Thursday and Friday on the month aiming to vaccinate at least 80% of identified target from 2021 unvaccinated children from eligible population.

Infectious Disease Cluster

National Tuberculosis Program

- Conduct of Coaching on the Guidelines and Implementation of the Expanded Eligibility Criteria for Latent Tuberculosis Infection Treatment (*April 19, 2022*)

A face-to-face activity with its goal to provide orientation and to review the guidelines set by the World Health Organization (WHO) on the identification of eligible contacts for TB Prevention Treatment.

- Dr. Janet M. Ibay, Regional NTP Medical Program Manager presented the Tuberculosis Preventive Treatment (TPT) implementation wherein the province has enrolled 157 TPT patients which is below the target of 1,320. Therefore, scaling up the TPT implementation is highly encouraged.
- Dr. Erwin L. Manzano, pulmonologist and TB – MAC Chairman emphasized salient key points as follows:

		<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. All TB contacts, PLHIV, and TB risk groups should be evaluated for eligibility to receive TPT 2. Active TB shall be excluded by symptom and chest X-ray prior to initiation of TPT 3. TPT should not be given to close contacts of MDR-TB and RR-TB 4. There are four (4) WHO-recommended treatment regimens for latent TB infection that are effective for use – Isoniazid (INH), Rifapentine (RPT), and/or Rifampin (RIF) 5. Healthcare workers should prescribe the more convenient shorter regimens when possible. Patients are more likely to complete shorter treatment regimens. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ms. Grace R. Crisologo, Provincial NTP Program Coordinator presented the Provincial Catch-up plan to ensure the implementation and sustainability of the TPT in the province.
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Attended the NurseLEAD Summit
2022
(April 5-7, 2022)

NurseLEAD: Leadership Course for Advanced Practice in Public Health Nursing is a trailblazing course offered by the University of the Philippines Manila College of Nursing, World Health Organization Collaborating Center for Leadership in Nursing Development, in partnership with the Johnson&Johnson Foundation. This postgraduate course aims to provide the health industry with public health nurse leaders with advanced skills to effectively lead the implementation of health care services in the provision of Universal Health Care. It also aims to strengthen nurse competencies in leading and managing primary care services and population-based programs, carrying out supervisory and leadership responsibilities, and fostering interprofessional education and collaborative practice.

- Ms. Grace R. Crisologo, Nurse II / NTP Coordinator from the Provincial Health Office has been selected to be one of the Oral Capstone Project presenters for Leadership. She presented her project focusing on Strengthening BHWs' Roles in TB Preventive Treatment in the Province of Isabela. Ms. Crisologo began her presentation by discussing the objective of the project. She cited that it is imperative for the BHWs and community volunteers to be equipped with the needed information and necessary knowledge to effectively assist the Province of Isabela in the attainment of the program's objectives. She shared to the group the vital role of the Provincial Government of Isabela in the implementation of the project. She also mentioned the good collaboration between the DOH Regional Office and the Provincial Health Office in the realization of the project. Lastly, she shared some good practices of the province with regards to the NTP Program.

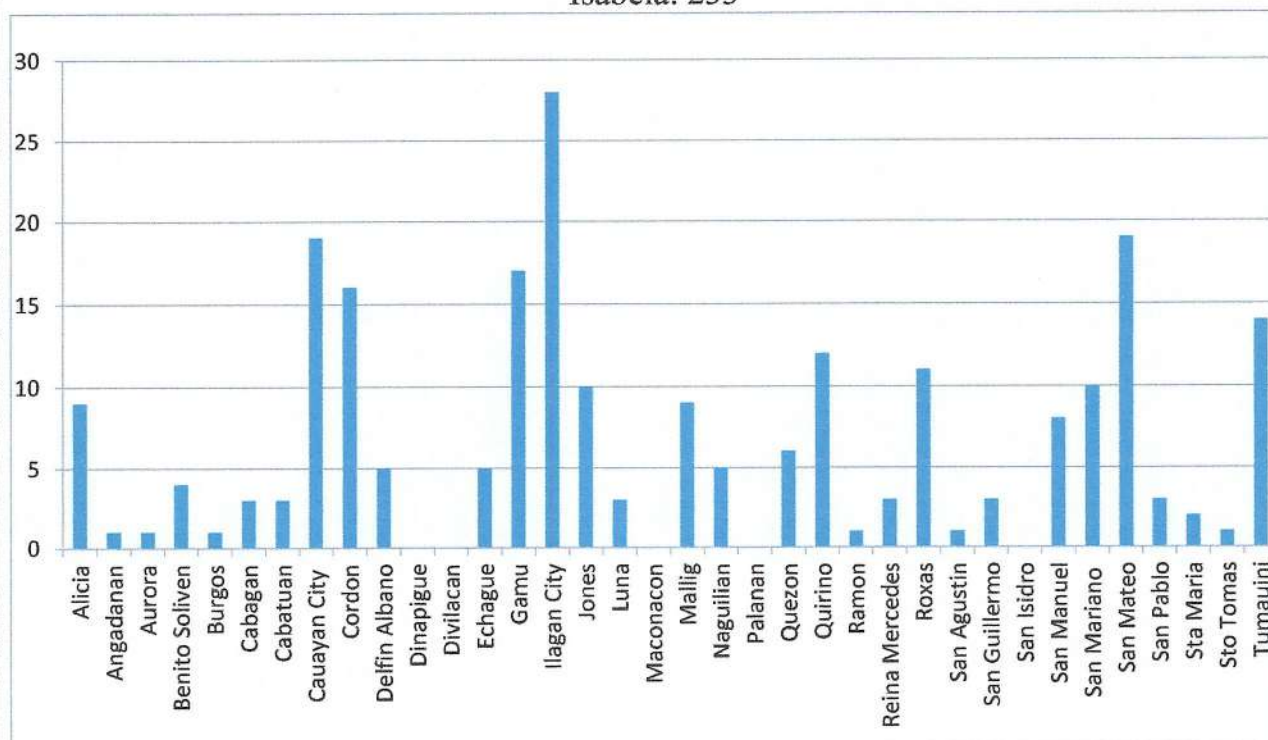



