Temporary Treatment and Monitoring Facilities (TTMF): AUGUST 2022

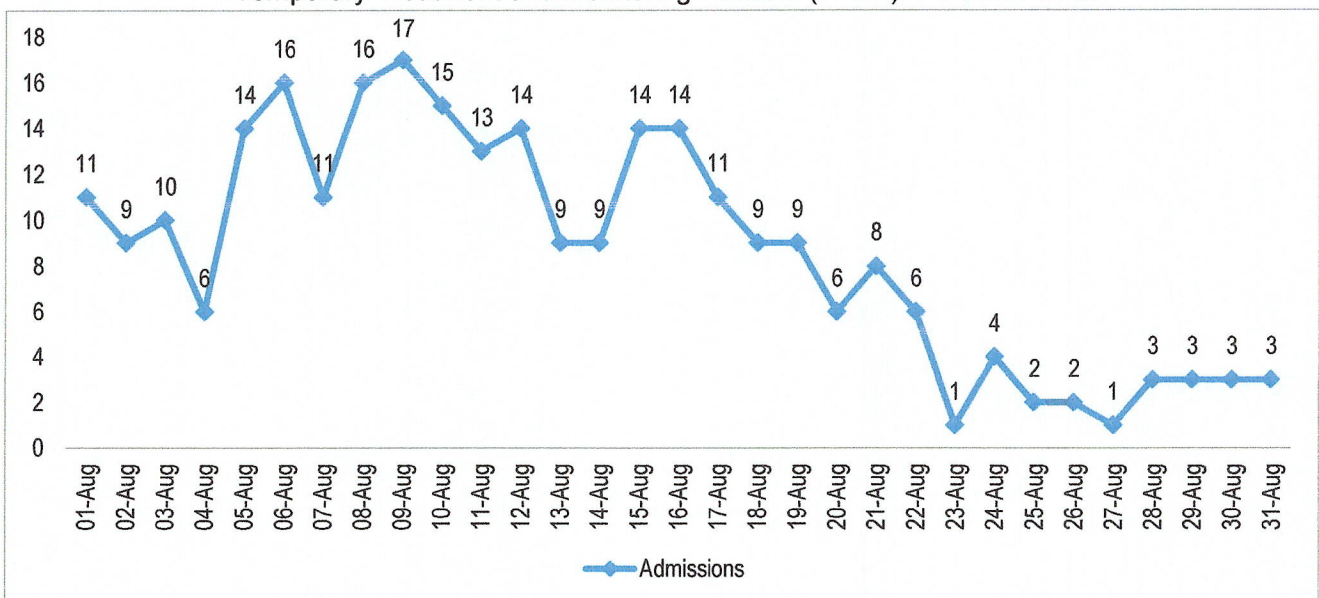


Figure 1. Admissions in the different TTMF in the municipalities of Isabela in August 2022

In congruence with the rise in active COVID cases, the province were also able to record admissions in the LGU TTMFs. From around 10-11 admissions in the past month, these numbers continued to rise until 17 admissions provincewide which gradually decreased to only three (3) admissions at the latest. Similarly, most admissions were mild active cases isolated in the facilities. Aside from TTMF admissions, most COVID related cases reported this month were still isolated or quarantined at home or in the hospitals.

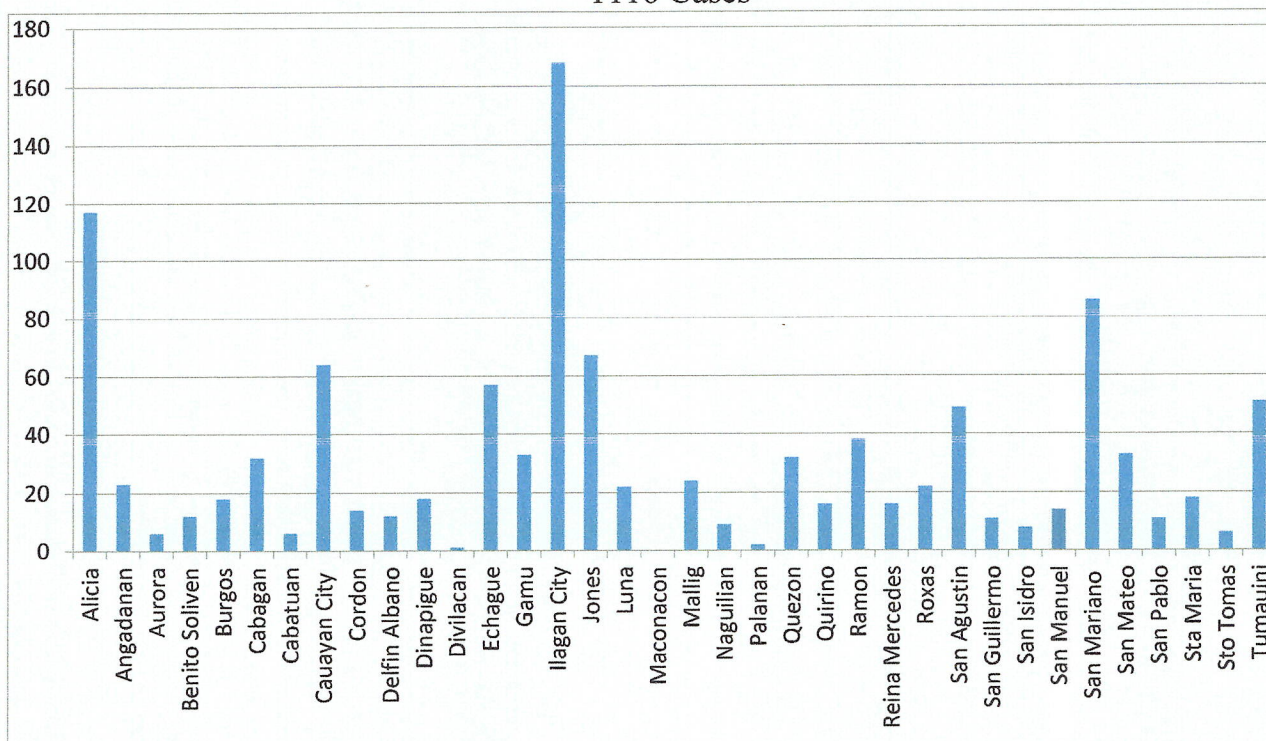


Figure 2. Number of reported suspected dengue cases per municipality/city.
