

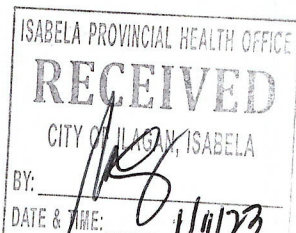

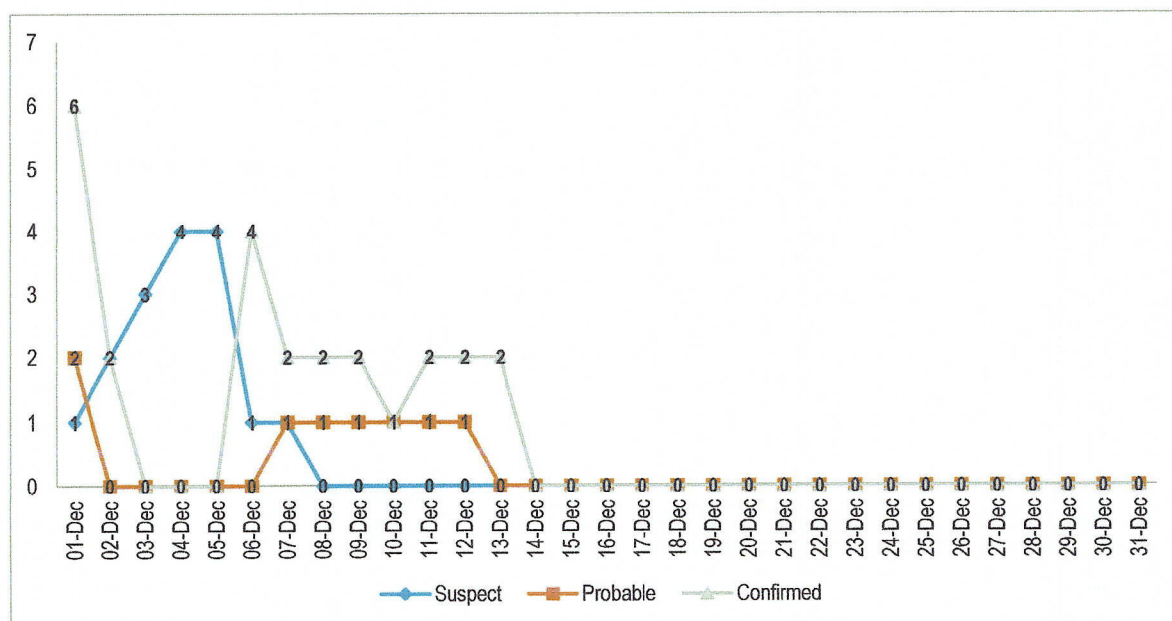


Figure 1. Admissions in the different TTMF in the municipalities of Isabela in December 2022

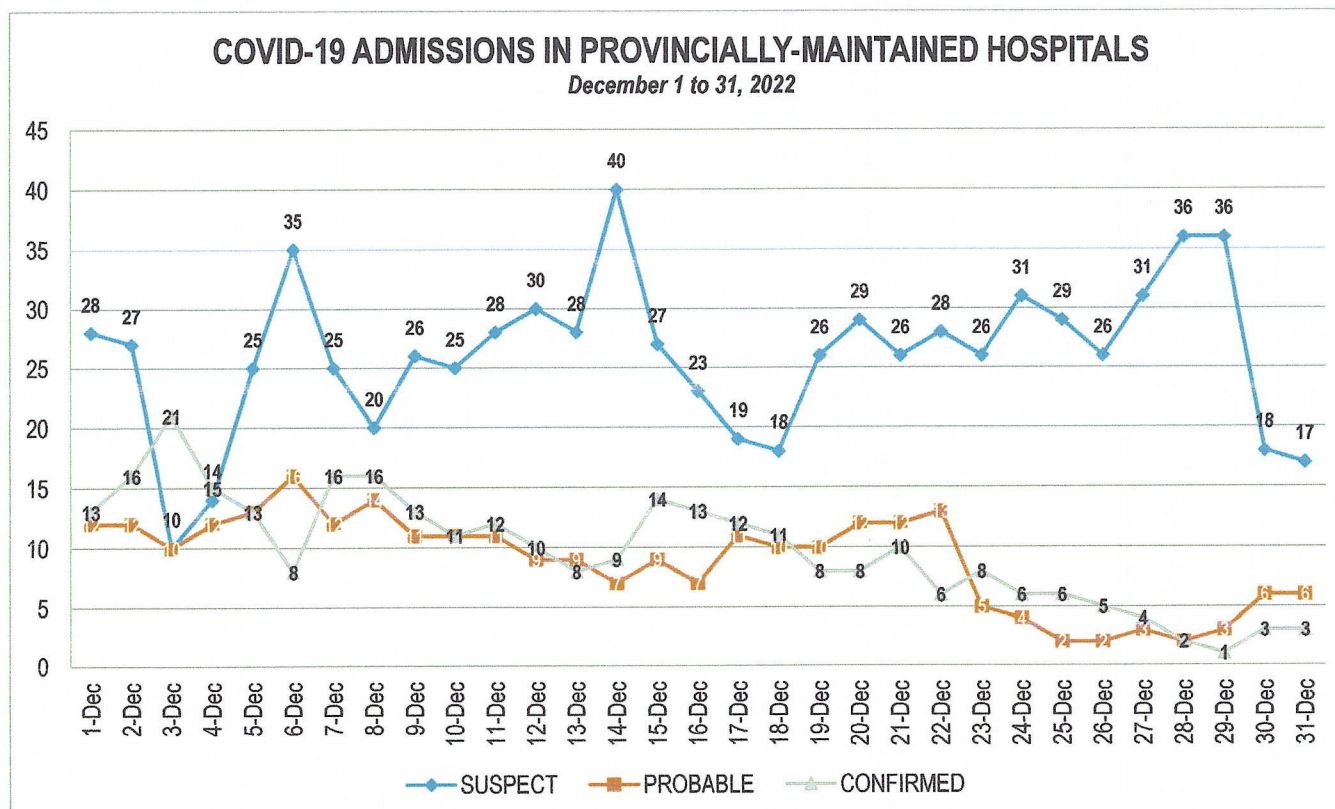

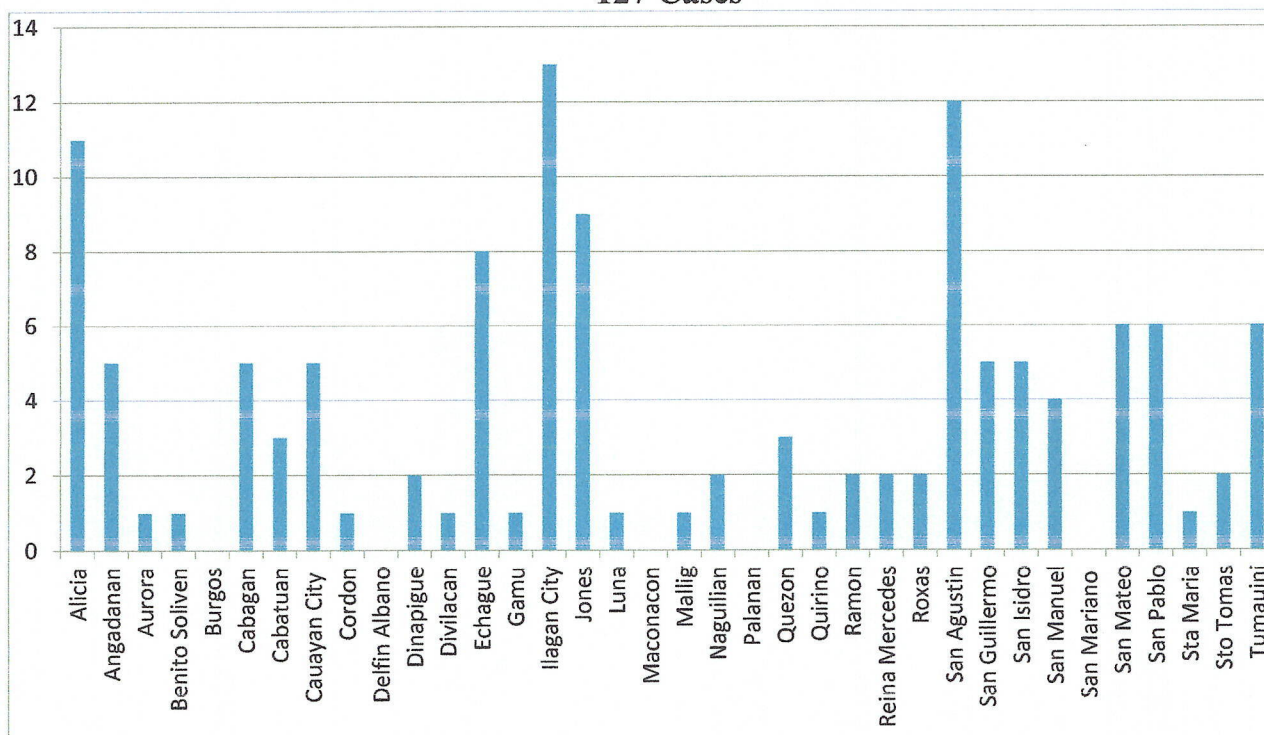


Figure 3. Number of reported suspected dengue cases per municipality/city.


