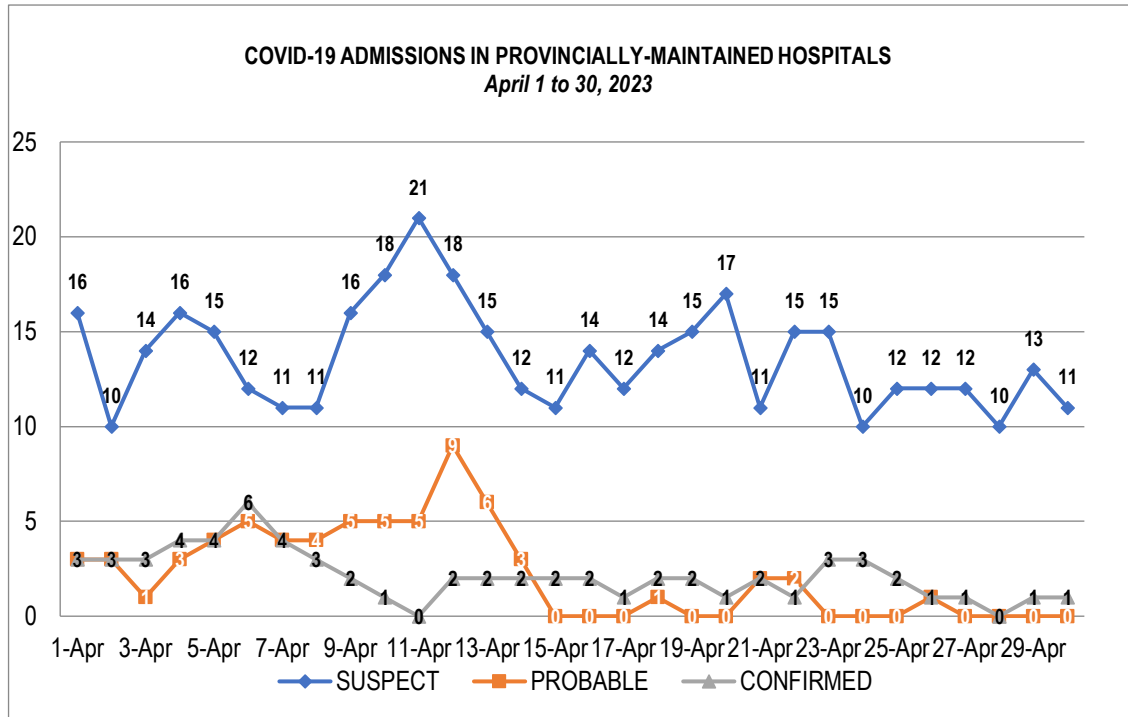

**Report on Monitoring of Temporary Treatment and Monitoring Facilities for the Month of April 2023**



Total daily COVID 19-related admissions in the seven (7) PGI hospitals for the month of April 2023

In the provincially-maintained hospitals, most COVID 19-related admissions for the month were suspect cases ranging from a total of 10 to 21 patients daily (Figure 1). Meanwhile, numbers of day-to-day admissions for probable and confirmed cases were not far from each other; patients tagged as probable vary from 0 to 9 total patients per day, while confirmed cases range from a total of 0 to 6. The full report on the specific number of COVID patients per category as to their hospital of admission is contained in Table 1.
