D. MALARIA ELIMINATION AND CONTROL PROGRAM

Province of Isabela Conferred as Malaria-Free Province

This declaration highlights the collaboration among government agencies, private sector partners, non-profit organizations, and local communities in achieving this significant milestone. The recognition was conferred by Dr. Teodoro J. Herbosa, Secretary of the Department of Health, in partnership with the World Health Organization-Philippines and Pilipinas Shell Foundation, Inc., acknowledging over a decade of efforts by local health workers to combat malaria in the province.

Dr. Nelson Paguirigan, Provincial Health Officer II of the Integrated Provincial Health Office (IPHO), and Mr. Marvin R. Valiente, Provincial Malaria Program Coordinator, received the award on behalf of the people of Isabela. Dr. Glenn Mathew G. Baggao, Undersecretary and Cluster Head of the Public Health Services Cluster, delivered the keynote address at the ceremony.
