**B. NATIONAL HIV, AIDS**

**AND STI PREVENTION  
AND CONTROL  
PROGRAM.**

Assisted in the conduct of Free Voluntary HIV Counselling and Screening for TB Patients and Pregnant Women at Reina Mercedes, Isabela

This in response to the request of the Rural Health Unit (RHU) of Reina Mercedes to Integrated Provincial Health Office through the National HIV, AIDS, and STI Prevention and Control Program for the conduct of HIV counseling and screening in their locality. This is due to the lack of trained personnel of their facility to carry out the activity.

The National HIV, AIDS, and STI Prevention and Control Program of the IPHO offered the essential support needed to ensure the successful delivery of this vital public health awareness and service. As a result of this collaboration, a total of 54 individuals were screened for HIV, 52 females and 4 males. Each patient received pre- and post-test counseling to ensure they understood the process and results. Health Education Promotion and Campaign was also conducted on HIV prevention, transmission giving emphasis on the prevention of mother-to-child transmission.

**C. RABIES PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM**

Conducted Rabies Fora in the Identified Priority Areas of the province.

The alarming rise in rabies deaths from January 2023 with six (6) to June 2024 with nine (9), signals the urgent need for intensified and strategic interventions to prevent further loss of life. Conducting rabies fora is essential to address these challenges and prevent more rabies-related deaths. These fora are vital platforms for raising awareness, educating the public and promoting preventive measures. This also provides an opportunity to review and amend existing rabies ordinances of each LGU for stricter implementation.

It was conducted in the following municipalities with scheduled dates:

- August 8, 2024 - City of Ilagan
- August 9, 2024- Sto. Tomas
- August 15, 2024- Jone
- August 16, 2024- Mallig
- August 22, 2024- San Mariano
- August 23, 2024- Quirino
- August 30, 2024- Cabagan

This collaboration among Local Government Units, Department of Agriculture, DOH CV-CHD, IPHO, PDOH, Regional Veterinary Office, Barangay officials and other concerned parties can significantly enhance the rabies control and prevention strategy.
