<p><b><u>NATIONAL TUBERCULOSIS PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM</u></b></p> <p>TB CARAVAN PLUS: Mobile Chest X-ray Screening and on the spot Sputum Collection for Gene Xpert cum Voluntary HIV Screening and PPD Testing - JUNE 5-13, 2024</p>	<p>One of the major activities under the TB Implementation Framework Agreement (TIFA) project is the conduct of active case finding activity dubbed as “TB CARAVAN PLUS”. This strategy brings to communities mobile TB diagnostic and treatment services thru mobile van with digital chest Xray machine. This helps address potential barriers to patients’ access to different health services. Through the application of symptom screening and the use of chest X-ray, the caravan aims to detect missed TB cases from the community in vulnerable/high-risk populations or groups. It makes possible on-site same-day diagnosis, especially for adults and children who can cough out sputum. Treatment can then be initiated immediately in collaboration with the DOTS facility.</p> <p>The primary objective of the activity is to detect missing TB cases earlier among those at highest risk which can lead to reducing the incidence of TB</p>	<p>A one-stop approach for Active Case Finding was conducted to the seven target municipalities. Other health programs were integrated with the ACF activity such as Flu &amp; Pneumonia vaccination, Lab tests for CBC, Chole, Syphilis &amp; HIV, Initiation of TB treatment and Information dissemination for TB &amp; HIV.</p> <p>A total of 1,364 presumptive TB clients who belong to the high risk and vulnerable groups were screened by Chest X-ray in the six target municipalities. Free voluntary HIV screening, PPD testing and other health services were also offered to the participants.</p> <p>The primary objective of the activity is to assess the overall performance of the TB program in terms of reducing TB incidence, improving treatment outcomes, and minimizing the spread of the disease. Faustino N. Dy Sr. Memorial Hospital. The review will contribute to surveillance efforts by providing data on factors contributing to the death and crucial for monitoring the impact of the disease and evaluating the effectiveness of control measures.</p>	<p>The team convened community people of the barangay as well as the barangay officials to educate them on the proper application of insecticides during spraying as well as on how to conduct proper vector surveillance to eliminate the possible breeding sites of mosquito.</p> <p>As a result of the conducted vector surveillance, out of 100 households that were selected randomly by the team in every barangay of the four Cities and Municipalities, findings shows that all 4 barangays were classified high risk in terms of Breteau index because of the presence of larvae in artificial containers (tires and bottles). Regional Monitoring and Evaluation of Local Level Plan Implementation Protocol (MELLPI Pro) in Isabela
