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A. RABIES PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM

Conducted the Rabies Forum in Quirino, Isabela

To identify gaps and provide a basis for decision-making in high-risk areas with reported rabies death, the DOH CVCHD in coordination with Isabela Provincial Health office through National Rabies Control and Prevention Program conducted a Rabies Forum in the municipality of Quirino, Isabela.

It was attended by fifty-three (53) participants- 18 female and 35 male, on October 4, 2024 composing of the different sectors of the community, barangay officials of the different barangays, RHU staff, and IPHO Rabies coordinator, CVCHD, Infectious Disease Cluster, Regional Surveillance Officer and the Regional DA Veterinarians.
