NATIONAL LEPROSY CONTROL PROGRAM</u></p> <p>Virtual Re-Orientation on the National Leprosy Control Program Manual of Procedures and Orientation on Other Skin Diseases (Sep 19-20, 2024)</p>	<p>The primary purpose of the activity is to re-orient health workers in the Local Government Unit (C/MHOs) on the National Leprosy Control Program Manual of Procedures and to provide comprehensive knowledge on the diagnosis, treatment, and management of other skin diseases based on the latest standards and guidelines. This is essential for improving patient care, enhancing public health outcomes, and effectively managing and controlling neglected tropical skin diseases.</p>	<p>A total of 97 participants, including doctors, nurses, and medical technologists, attended the virtual re-orientation. The latest updates to the National Leprosy Control Program Manual of Procedures were presented. Participants were informed about the policies and procedures, including case detection and treatment. Emphasis was given to case management, case detection, and reporting. Two dermatologists from the Department of Dermatology and Venereology at Southern Isabela Medical Center discussed both simple and complex skin diseases, covering their diagnosis, symptoms, and treatment management. Rabies Fora in Mallig, and Cabagan, Isabela (September 12 & 24, 2024)

To identify gaps and provide a basis for decision-making in high-risk areas with reported rabies death, the DOH CVCHD in coordination with Isabela Provincial Health office through National Rabies Control and Prevention Program conducted a Rabies Forum in the municipalities of Mallig and Cabagan, Isabela. The activity aims to raise public awareness through comprehensive education and engagement in initiatives, address escalating concerns surrounding rabies cases in the region and secure commitments and collaborative efforts from different partner agencies.

- Facilitated by IPHO in collaboration with MHOs of Mallig and Cabagan, Infectious Disease Cluster of CVCHD, Regional Epidemiology and Surveillance Unit, Department of Agriculture – Regional Office;
- Attended by the barangay officials of Mallig, and Cabagan, Isabela.
- Advocated for the strengthened implementation and necessary amendments of existing rabies ordinances
- Identification of next steps and solutions to the issues and concerns raised during the fora and Secured Commitments of partners and members of the Regional Rabies Committee.
