A. NATIONAL TUBERCULOSIS PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM

TB Data Quality Check (DQC) cum Consultative Meeting

This activity aims to check the completeness, accuracy and timeliness of the data recorded by all iDOTS facilities, TB Microscopy Laboratories and Rapid TB Diagnostic Laboratories (RTDLs) in the province to ensure the quality of reported data in the IT IS. Subsequently, this is to analyze validated TB accomplishments and plans for the achievement of 2025 targets.

Ms. Grace R. Crisologo, the Provincial NTP Coordinator, presented the Provincial NTP Accomplishment Report for 2024, highlighting the collective efforts to screen, diagnose, treat, and prevent initiatives to achieve the program’s targets.

Other matters discussed during the consultative meeting were the following: Status of DRTB Implementation in the province, issues and concerns of Rapid TB Diagnostic Facilities (RTDLs), Mandatory TB Notification implementation and schedule for the active case finding activities for the 2nd quarter of 2025.

NATIONAL IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM

Attended the Program Implementation Review & Microplanning 2025 of the City Health Offices of Cauayan City

As part of the COVID-19 Vaccine Delivery Support Third (3rd) Tranche, the City of Cauayan conducted a Program Implementation Review and Microplanning Session to assess and review the overall performance and accomplishment of the National Immunization Program. This is an integrated activity of the three (3) City Health Offices. Also, the activity focuses on the data analysis and identifying gaps, issues and challenges encountered by the barangays in their implementation of immunization services

On February 28, 2025, Ms. Claravall of PHO attended the PIR and shared inputs based on the presentation of accomplishments presented by the NIP coordinators from CHOs I, II, III.

Attended the Exit Meeting & Year-end Program Review and Impact Assessment for CDS3

To assess the progress and review the impact of the support provided to the National Immunization Program through the COVID-19 Vaccine Delivery Support Third (3rd) Tranche for the year 2024 of the UNICEF through Relief International.

Conducted by the CVCHD through the Regional NIP and Vaccines Operation Regional Center, where Ms. Claravall, IPHO's NIP Coordinator presented the province's accomplishments highlighting the "Batang Isabeleno, sa Bakuna Protektado", Isabela SHIELD Against Cervical Cancer, and the advocacy for Local Leaders "Buntis, Nutrisyon, Bakuna+ Patrol". These provincial initiatives helped in improving the implementation of immunization program in the province.

NUTRITION PROGRAM

Provision of assistance to UNICEF Philippines on Nutrition in Emergencies monitoring in the municipalities of Cordon, San Isidro, and Reina Mercedes

The visit aims to support data collection and monitoring of the high frequency nutrition indicators related to the multiple storms that hit the province in the last quarter of 2024, specifically Super Typhoon Pepito.

The IPHO Health Program Managers also assisted the UNICEF consultant in the duration of her visit in the province. Ms. Susan also did a brief courtesy visit to Dr. Nelson Paguirigan, Provincial Health Officer II - Isabela.

Summary of observations and recommendations are reflected in the Post-activity Report.

<p>Assessment of Establishments and Health Care Facilities for Mother-Baby Friendly Workplace Certification</p>	<p>The Mother-Baby Friendly Workplace Certification is a health sector strategy pursuant to Republic Act 10028, or the Expanded Breastfeeding Promotion Act of 2009, that aims to provide a supportive environment for lactating mothers to continue breastfeeding in workplaces whether as an employee or a client through the enforcement of a workplace breastfeeding policy, provision of a lactation station, and observance of a 40-minute lactation break for breastfeeding employees to feed their child or express their milk.</p>	<p>The IPHO Isabela MBFW Assessment Team conducted the first level assessment for the MBFW certification of SM City Cauayan through an onsite visit on February 7, 2025 and in the 42 barangays of Jones, Isabela on February 18-21, 2025. The team reviewed the workplace breastfeeding policy, inspected their breastfeeding station, interviewed different employees, and inquired about other practices supportive of lactation in the workplace and the Milk Code of the Philippines.</p> <p>The team then provided a summary of their observations and recommendations to the employees present, recognizing both their good practices and areas they can still improve on should they be endorsed for the evaluation by the CVCHD and NNC RO2.</p>

<p>Readiness Assessment of the World Health Organization on Healthy Heart Programme in the Province of Isabela</p>	<p>The Healthy Hearts Program was launched in the Philippines in 2018 through a collaboration between WHO and the Department of Health (DOH), with funding from Resolve to Save Lives. Its primary objective is to reduce premature mortality and morbidity due to cardiovascular diseases by scaling up and sustaining a hypertension control technical package at the subnational level.</p>	<p>The IPHO team facilitated the assessment, assisting WHO and CVCHD in evaluating the capacity, service availability, and readiness of different municipalities to implement the Healthy Hearts Program. The findings from three municipalities—RHU Delfin Albano, RHU Cabagan, and RHU Tumauni.</p> <p>WHO recommends increasing the PhilPEN screening to 80% of adults aged 20 and above. For hypertension care, the target is to diagnose 80% of adults with hypertension, ensure 80% receive treatment, and achieve blood pressure control in 80% of treated patients. Among the assessed population at risk, 80% of those diagnosed with hypertension must receive treatment. Additionally, among those given treatment or medication, 80% must achieve controlled blood pressure levels.</p> <p>In line with this, there is a need for additional procurement of essential commodities and medicines, as well as maximizing Konsulta claims to strengthen the use of ClinicSys and enhance the implementation of the Konsulta Package.</p>
