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	<p>Psycho-Social Care Services</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provision of therapeutic activities/psychological wellness accorded by the Mental Health Practitioners. • Four (4) newly admitted clients have referred for psychological assessment while 3 clients have undergone psychological therapy session to registered Psychologist. • Mental Health Practitioners have conducted group dynamics to 16 residents. • Social Workers/Mental Health Practitioners have rendered small talk/counseling to clients with PTSD and psychological distress. 																		

	Educational Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Fifteen (15) residents have provided with school allowances, supplies, uniforms, and other school needs and projects. • House parents have attended classroom quarterly meeting to discuss education related issues of learners/children. Likewise, giving and awarding of Progress Report Card and Academic Excellence Award to learners/children. • Fifteen (15) clients are officially enrolled in public school and college, five (5) of whom are elementary graders, six (6) are in Junior High School, one (1) enrolled in Alternative Learning System (ALS), two (2) are in Senior High School and one (1) is currently enrolled in College. • The Center Head made a courtesy call with the newly assigned School Principal of Alibagu Elementary School, Dr. Coleen M. Estrellon and discussed some issues and concerns of enrolled residents. • House Parents have assisted six (6) Junior High School students with the submission of the answered learning modules and projects to their respective class advisers.
	Health Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provision of food supplement/vitamins have provided to all residents and two (2) babies. • Referred six (6) clients to FNDM Hospital for medical check-up/consultation, laboratories, ECG and availed of free medicines. • Three (3) residents have undergone dental services like tooth extraction and cleaning. • Two (2) babies have undergone provisions of complete immunization (BCG, Hepa. B, DPT-Hepa. B-HiB, OPV, IPV, PCV, and MMR)and continuous intake of vitamins. • Monthly physical check-up including checking of height and weight to all residents for health monitoring.
	Legal Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Social Workers conducted court follow-up relative to schedule of court hearing of five (5) clients. • Court orientation to three (3) clients in preparation for court appearance and direct examination. Likewise, presented clients to handling Prosecutors for briefing of sworn statements and establishing rapport. • Requested a copy of Information, Resolution and other legal documents (for new clients) at the office of the Provincial Prosecutor. • Three (3) court hearings have attended by the Social Workers, likewise escorted three (3)clients at the Regional Trial Court of Br. 17 and 22.

	Spiritual Services and Value Inculcation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All staff and residents have undergone recollection activities for Spiritual growth and values formation. All residents have their group daily prayer and devotion (evening and morning). House Parents have facilitated the Bible sharing together with the residents every weekend.
	Recreational, Sports and other Socio-Cultural Activities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Utilized existing outdoor playground facilities. Regular zumba dance was participated by the staff and children every afternoon at the playground area.
	Economic/Livelihood Skills and Development.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Provisions of Capital Assistance have provided by the PGI-PSWD/GAD Fund to fourteen (14) clients including parents and guardians who have undergone recent Skills Trainings. Motivation of skills learned through income generating/livelihood activity like doughnut making, baking and others.
	Financial Assistance	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Provided financial assistance for transportation expenses of mother in going back home who came to visit the child in WCPC.

Complete admission requirements have provided by the referring parties. Completion of case folder of (18 clients) with Intervention Plan, Progress Report, Medical record, Anecdotal and other legal documents.
