


Women and Children Protection Center	Home Life Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This month, a total of 23 residents have provided with complete meals/nutritive food, clothing, toiletries and other personal needs. • Positive discipline and values formation have afforded to all residents. • All admitted residents have guided in managing personal hygiene and self-care. • Conducted monthly meeting with the residents and able to address their issues and concerns. • Supervised and monitored home life and other daily activities of children. • Conducted monthly character building to all the residents. • Instituted the best performer among residents to boost moral values and recognized work life experience. • This month, two (2) admitted clients were referred by the LGU-MSWDOs for temporary shelter & protective custody. 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	Psycho-Social Care Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • As part rehabilitation services, Mental Health Practitioners (MHP)/Psychometrician were provided 15 sessions on group dynamics to all residents having PTSD. • Provision of individual counseling and other psychological wellness activities to six (6) residents having severe anxiety. • One (1) resident had been undergoing psych therapy session to a registered Psychologist. • MHPs conducted initial psychological assessment to two (2) newly admitted clients and referred to registered Psychologist for further evaluation.
	Educational Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Fourteen (14) residents are presently enrolled at the nearby public school, four (4) are elementary graders and ten (10) are in secondary school. • Provision of school supplies, complete school uniforms, and allowances were given to all residents enrolled in formal education. • House parents assisted four (4) children/learners in going to elementary school and fetched them after classes.
	Health Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All admitted residents including two (2) babies have provided with food supplement: multi-vitamins and vitamin-C to boost immune system. • Resident's dependent (baby) was referred & confined at the FNDM Hospital with provision of free laboratory, medicines, and hospital bill likewise assisted/monitored by the In-House Nurse. • Monthly physical examination including checking of height and weight to all residents for health monitoring of In-house Nurse. • Provision of physical activities like zumba dance, outdoor games, and table games were provided to all residents to maintain healthy mind and body.
	Legal Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Presented and assisted clients to the Prosecutor for further briefing (sworn statement) and in preparation of the latter to testify in the court. • Social workers have escorted eight (8) residents/minors at the Regional Trial Court Branch 17, 18, 23, 24, & 40 respectively for pre-trial, direct, and cross examinations.
	Spiritual Services and Values Inculcation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All residents have their group daily prayer and devotion (evening and morning) as part of spiritual formation. • Values formation was accorded to all residents. • As part of healing and recovery, spiritual enrichment was provided to all residents through Bible Sharing and memorizing verses facilitated by Religious Group/CWL and House parents.
	Recreational, Sports and other Socio-	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Utilized existing outdoor playground facilities and table games for recreational & physical activities of the children/residents.

	Cultural Activities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Larong Lahi like “sungka”, patintero, piko & etc. were instilled to all young residents during their leisure time for fun and socialization. • Birthdays and other events were also celebrated.
	Economic/ Livelihood Skills and Development	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Inculcation on sharing of profit among the residents out of their livelihood activity. • For possible adeptness of skills learned, return demo of skills acquired were accorded to some residents. • All residents were motivated in joining income generating/ livelihood activity like doughnut making, baking and others.
	Financial Assistance	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • For relatives/parents who came to the Center to visit their children, provision of financial assistance were provided to them by the PGI-PSWDO.
	Case Management	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Two (2) pre-admission conference, two (2) admission conference, and three (3) discharge conference were convened with the Rehabilitation Team and referring parties. • Completion of case folder of 23 clients with Intervention Plan, Progress Report, Medical Record, Anecdotal/observation, psychological report, and other legal documents & records. • Conducted one (1) home visit to client’s family for validation of Parenting Capability Assessment Report submitted by the CSWDO for possible reintegration of client.
