Recreational, Sports and other Socio- Cultural Activities	<ul> <li>All children are given privilege for free play and outdoor sports activities every Tuesday and Thursday for enhancement physical, mental, and social development.</li> <li>With closed supervision from the house parents, every Wednesday and Friday, children are given opportunity to contact/talk with their respective family or relatives by using mobile phone for purpose of "kamustahan" and to feel their importance and moral support from them.</li> <li>Every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, all children are given opportunity to have their zumba dance in the afternoon while Saturday &amp; Sunday afternoon is for viewing time and videoke for mental therapy, relaxation, socialization, and acquaintance with their co-resident.</li> </ul>
Economic/ Livelihood Skills and Development	<ul> <li>During free time, provision of livelihood and income generating activity were continuously imparted to 18 children.</li> <li>One client having intellectual disability was continuously taught in "door rug making" for adeptness and knowhow, in preparation for possible reintegration to her family.</li> </ul>
Financial Assistance	<ul> <li>Provision of financial assistance from the PGI/PSWDO for transportation allowance/fare in going back home for residents' parents &amp; relatives who came to visit their respective children.</li> </ul>
