


Conducted monthly meeting with the residents and able to address their issues and concerns. Conducted monthly character building to all the residents and choose the best performer among residents to boost moral values and recognized work life experience in the center. Admitted two (2) siblings for temporary shelter & protective custody.

	Psycho-Social Care Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Two (2) admitted clients have undergone initial psychological assessment administered by Mental Health Practitioners, Ms. Alliana Dawn Salmos & Ms. Alyssa Mary Ballesteros. Two (2) clients were referred to a Psychologist, Dr. Kathreen Joson for psychological interview and evaluation. Provision of group counseling have provided to six (6) clients with manifested of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. Mental Health Practitioners, Ms. Salmos and Ms. Ballesteros conducted individual counseling and group dynamics to twenty (20) clients having distress. 	
	Educational Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Provision of daily school needs including other expenses for projects are provided to all sixteen (16) learners enrolled in formal education & Alternative Learning System. All learners were provided with school allowance for fare going to school and snacks. 	

	Health Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • One (1) client was referred & confined at the FNNDM Hospital with provision of free laboratory, medicine, and hospital bill. Likewise, the mother availed of assistance from the Malasakit Center. • Two (2) residents' babies were referred to Pediatrician for check-up/consultation due to cough and colds with provision of free medicines and food supplement. • Fifteen (15) clients were brought to GFNDM Hospital for provision of free dental check-up, fluoride, cleaning and tooth extraction. • In-House Nurse conducted weekly physical examination including checking of height and weight to all residents for health monitoring.
	Legal Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • One (1) client successfully received fair decision from the RTC Br. 19. The accused found guilty relative to client's filed criminal complaint. • Four (4) clients were assisted and escorted in attending court hearings at the Regional Trial Court of Branch 18, 19, & 23.
	Spiritual Services and Values Incultation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Incultation of spiritual activities through regular group prayer and devotion (evening and morning) were provided to all residents to improved spiritual growth.
	Recreational, Sports and other Socio-Cultural Activities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Valentine's Day was celebrated with activity on the search for Miss/Little Miss WCPC. The activity aims to develop their talents and confidence. • Special event: Birthday of one resident was celebrated by showing warmth and providing her preferred food. • The residents were given opportunity to use the playground facilities and free play to improve social interaction and support system.
	Economic/Livelihood Skills and Development	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All residents were motivated in joining income generating/ livelihood activity like baking & pastry making to toughen know-how. • Incultation on sharing of profit among the residents out of their livelihood activity.
	Financial Assistance	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provision of financial assistance for transportation allowance/fare in going back home for residents' parents & relatives who came to visit their respective children.
	Case Management	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Completion of case folder of twenty two (22) admitted children with Case Study Report, Intervention Plan, Running Notes, Monthly Anecdotal Report, Medical Record, Daily Observation Logbook, and other records.
