Women and Children Protection Center	Home Life Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> There are 19 children were provided with provision of temporary shelter and protective custody. All admitted residents basically accorded with daily food & snacks, toiletries, and other essential needs, charged to MOOE. All residents have guided in daily life experiences like managing personal hygiene, self-care, involvement in doing household chores and to value the importance of time management for the direction of their daily activities in the Center. Conducted monthly meeting and or convened urgent meeting with the residents for immediate action on their issues and concerns. Conducted monthly character building to all the residents and choose the best performer among residents to boost moral values and recognized worth life experience in the Center. There are six residents have afforded with individual counseling conducted by the Psychologist, Alliana Dawn Salmos and Psychometrician, Ms. Alyssa Mary Ballesteros. Provision of group dynamics to all residents for psychological wellness activity conducted by Psychologist, Ms. Salmos. 																						
	Educational Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> At least twice a week visitation of ALS coordinator Ms. Charmaine Jimenez to conduct tutorial and learning sessions to client. All 15 children who are enrolled in formal education have regularly provided with school supplies, snacks, daily fare for five elementary learners and one Senior High School attending face to face class. Likewise for modular learners (high school students), provision of fare in submitting answered modules and to pick-up other modules from their respective class adviser. 																						

	Health Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provision on group health session on Anti-Tetanus and Reproductive System & Parts of the Body were conducted to all residents for enhancement of learning. • This month, 12 residents were afflicted with common colds, cough, skin allergy, shoulder/hand blister, toothache, back pain & wounds provided with free medicines and vitamins. • There are two clients have provided with free consultation and X-ray at the GFNDM Hospital. • Regular monitoring of height and weight conducted by the In-House Nurse to determine the Body Mass Index of every child/resident for possible health intervention of undernourished and overweight.
	Legal Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There are three clients were assisted at the Regional Trial Court Br. 18 for court hearings last September 12, 16, & 23.
	Spiritual Services and Values Inculcation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continuous provision of spiritual enhancement to all children through group prayer, morning worship, and Bible sharing inculcated by the staff and other religious group. • Every child was motivated to lead the prayer during meal time as part of spiritual teaching. • Conducted monthly character building session to all residents for values formation on "Self-control".
	Recreational, Sports and other Socio-Cultural Activities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Three children were celebrated their natal day with provision of traditional food prepared for them like "pansit, cake, and chicken joy". • Privilege for free play and outdoor sports activities every Tuesday and Thursday for enhancement of physical, mental, and social development were continuously provided all resident. • Special event - Family Day was celebrated in the Center last 27, 2024. Parents of every resident were invited for bonding, "Salo-salo sa Hapag-kainan" during lunch time and it was highlighted by Family Got Talent Contest to show case their respective talents in dancing and singing. Three families have chosen as Best Presentation with cash prizes while others have given consolation prizes. Likewise, round trip fare was also provided to them in going back home. Slogan contest was also part of the activity and given cash prizes to five chosen winners. This activity was charged to GAD Fund.
	Economic/ Livelihood Skills and Development	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • During free time, provision of livelihood and income generating activity were continuously imparted to 18 children. Almost residents have their ability to come-up with a door rug out of used clothes. Profits/gain was equally divided among the residents as an agreement and motivation to become self-reliant.
	Case Management	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Center Head/Case manager conducted home visit to child's family in Brgy. San Jose, San Mariano, Isabela in preparation of reintegration. • Updating of case folder of 19 admitted children with Case Study Report, Intervention Plan, Running Notes, Monthly Anecdotal Report, Medical Record, Daily Observation Logbook, and other records. • This month, convened discharged case conference with the presence of MSWDO, parent of client and other members of rehabilitation team. Likewise, discussion of After Care Plan and turning over of the client to her biological father with agreement/conformity pertaining to child's safety and protection and reminded of other responsibilities to the latter. • Attended court proceedings and other activities of every resident. • Collaboration with the PNP-WCPD for possible update of at-large perpetrators.
