This activity was conducted by the Mental Health Practitioners assigned in the Center.</li> <li>Four (4) residents having depression were provided with individual counseling conducted by the In-House Psychologist.</li> </ul>																						
	<b>Educational Services</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Provision of regular learning session with the one resident enrolled in Alternative Learning System conducted by the ALS coordinator, Ms. Charmaine Jimenez.</li> <li>There are 14 children currently enrolled in formal education have regularly provided with school supplies, snacks, as well as daily fare for five elementary learners and one Senior High School attending face to face class.</li> <li>For modular learners (high school students), provision of fare in submitting answered modules &amp; projects for 1<sup>st</sup> quarter likewise, to get their 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter modules from their respective adviser.</li> </ul>																						

	<b>Health Services</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Provision on health teaching on Typhoid t Fever and Hepatitis B were discussed by the In-House Nurse to all children for enhancement of learning.</li> <li>• One resident/client was confined at the GFNDM Hospital was availed of provision of free laboratories, Ultrasound, medicines, and hospital bill.</li> <li>• Due to unpredictable weather/rainy season, there are about six client afflicted with fever, cough and colds with provision of free medicines and check-up at the provincial hospital.</li> <li>• All residents were accorded with multivitamins and vitamin C to boost up their immune system.</li> <li>• Group of female Pediatricians also conducted outreach activity through discussion/lecture on proper hygiene and mental health awareness to all residents.</li> <li>• One client was referred to GFNDM Hospital with provision of free dental check-up and medicine.</li> </ul>
	<b>Legal Services</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Two clients were presented to Pros. Rosa Albano and Pros. Jennifer Montefalco for briefing of sworn statement in preparation for direct examination (client) and for legal consultation.</li> <li>• This month, there were five clients assisted at the RTC Branch 18, 19, 23, &amp; 24 for court hearings, pre-trial and arraignment.</li> </ul>
	<b>Spiritual Services and Values Inculcation</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Regardless for their religious belief, every child was motivated to lead the prayer during meal time as part of spiritual teaching.</li> <li>• Provision of spiritual activities to all residents like attending Holy Mass, Bible Sharing/fellowship, singing worship songs, and evening/morning prayer to strengthen their faith in God.</li> <li>• Encouraged all residents in joining group prayer, reading the Bible and memorizing verses for values formation.</li> </ul>
	<b>Recreational, Sports and other Socio-Cultural Activities</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Part of the rehabilitative services is the recreational activity wherein all children have time for free play by using table/board games, larong lahi, and ball games, to develop sportsmanship, team work, and camaraderie.</li> <li>• In a simple way, provision of favored food for the two residents who celebrated their birthdays this month.</li> </ul>
	<b>Economic/ Livelihood Skills and Development</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Provision of livelihood and income generating activity were continuously imparted to all children for continuous learning on pastry making. Proceeds were equally divided among the residents as an agreement and motivation to become self-reliant.</li> </ul>
	<b>Case Management</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Regular updating of case folder of 18 admitted children with Case Study Report, Intervention Plan, Running Notes, Monthly Anecdotal Report, Medical Record, Daily Observation Logbook, and other records are confidentially intact and filed.</li> <li>• Attended court proceedings and other legal activities of every resident.</li> <li>• Consultation meeting with the case managers and other members of rehabilitation team pertaining to status of every client.</li> <li>• Continuous collaboration with the stakeholders: PNP/WCPD, Teachers/Principal, Prosecutors, and Court Social Workers for case management updates.</li> </ul>
