Out of this numeral, one (1) client was discharged to her biological father witnessed by the MSWDO/Social Worker last February 26.</li><li>All residents were properly guided in their daily homelife activities including time management in order to restore life functioning and self-skills.</li><li>The Center Head regularly conducted monthly meeting with the residents for immediate action on their issues and concerns likewise, emphasized the rules and policies of the shelter.</li><li>Continuous instilling on good values to all residents including character building was discussed and observed. At the end of the month, the house parents/staff will choose the best performer among residents to boost moral values and confidence.</li></ul>

Provision of medicines was provided by the Center.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Continuous provision of individual counseling was provided to three (3) clients having anxiety.</li><li>• Mental Health Professional/Psychologist, Ms. Alliana Dawn Salmos conducted Mental Status Examination to one (1) client having anxiety/depression prior for referral to a Psychiatrist.</li><li>• Provision of Group Dynamics was provided to all residents conducted by the Psychometrician, Ms. Alyssa Mary Ballesteros. It aims for enhancement self-esteem and interpersonal skills of every client.</li><li>• Mental Health Professionals and Social Workers likewise, conducted briefing and psychologically prepared the clients before attending the court hearings for direct and cross examinations.</li></ul>
	<b>Educational Services</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Out of sixteen (16) residents enrolled in formal education &amp; ALS, there are eight (8) learners received an Academic Excellence Award (With Honors) for third quarter. The Houseparents assisted them to received their awards.</li><li>• Continuous collaboration and monitoring with the school teachers was being made by the Center Head for learners’ safety and protection in the school premises.</li><li>• As part of school participation, the house parents attended Brigada Eskwela and Parents Teacher Association (PTA) meeting to addressed issues and concerns of in-school children.</li><li>• Provision of educational assistance was continually provided to all residents enrolled in formal education like school supplies, allowance/fare, projects and others.</li><li>• Likewise, the house parents assisted the secondary learners in complying, answering, and submitting their modules to their respective class advisers.</li></ul>
	<b>Health Services</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Continuous provision of medicines was provided to all residents who experienced mild illnesses cough, colds, headache, and sore throat. Likewise, multi-vitamins/vitamin C administered to them to boost immune system.</li><li>• There are two (2) clients availed of dental check-up and tooth extraction with provision of free medicines from the GFNDM Hospital.</li><li>• This month, one (1) was assisted and confined at the GFNDM Hospital due to Acute Gastroenthritis with</li></ul>

		<p>free medicines and hospital bill availed from the GFNDM Hospital.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Provision of dental services and tooth extraction was availed by the two (2) residents.</li><li>• Referred and assisted one (1) client at the RHU-I Ilagan for sputum with negative result.</li><li>• Checking of height and weight of all residents was also part of medical and physical activities done by the In-House Nurse for purpose of health monitoring by using the Body Mass Index (BMI) Chart.</li><li>• For health promotion, the In-House Nurse was continually provided health sessions among residents through discussion on Proper Hygiene and Proper Tooth Brushing Technique in relation to the National Children’s Dental Health Month aims to promote the benefits of good oral hygiene.</li></ul>
	<b>Legal Services</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• There are ten (10) residents were escorted and assisted in the court for arraignment, direct examination, and cross examination at the Regional Trial Court Branch 16, 17, 18, 19, 23, 24, &amp; 40.</li><li>• The Center Head and Social Worker Ms. Balayan assisted/escorted client at the Regional Trial Court Br. 24 relative to the filed Motion for Reconsideration with the assistance of Pros. Sherwin Battung.</li></ul>
	<b>Spiritual Services and Values Inculcation</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Spiritual activity: Holy Mass celebration was conducted inside the Center presided by Fr. Anthony Pizarro as part of kick-off activity in the celebration of Valentine’s Day wherein all children attended regardless of their religion.</li><li>• All residents were guided in daily life experienced through group prayer and devotion every morning and evening including before and after mealtime as part of spiritual teaching.</li><li>• All residents were motivated to lead the prayer and by joining other spiritual activities. Likewise, they are free to practice their respective religion.</li></ul>
	<b>Recreational, Sports and other Socio-Cultural Activities</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Children are given opportunity to celebrate Valentine’s Day as part of recreational &amp; socio-cultural awareness. This festivity was highlighted by Cheer Dance competition. Every resident is observed to be competitive by showing and discovering their inner talents. This activity somehow helped the children in recouping self-esteem and strengthen camaraderie.</li></ul>

	<b>Economic/ Livelihood Skills and Development</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Mastery of skills learned was continually provided to residents for income generating during their allotted time for livelihood activity.</li></ul>
	<b>Case Management</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Convened urgent meeting pertaining to one (1) client for possible referral to CVMC - Department of Behavioral Medicine.</li><li>Discharged conference was convened last February 26, together with the referring parties (MSWDOs) and other members of the rehabilitation team.</li><li>Regular updating of case folder of 18 admitted children with Case Study Report, Intervention Plan, Running Notes, Monthly Anecdotal Report, Medical Record, Daily Observation Logbook, and other records are continually updated and properly filed.</li><li>Attended court proceedings and other legal activities of every resident.</li><li>Continuous collaboration with the stakeholders: PNP/WCPD, Teachers/Principal, Prosecutors, and Court Social Workers for case management update.</li></ul>
