AGENCY PROFILE

The Echague District Hospital, formerly Primo Gaffud District Hospital was originally located at San Fabian, Echague, Isabela and started operating in 1974 as a ten-bed capacity primary hospital. In May 2005, it was relocated at Ipil, Echague, Isabela in one of the four district hospitals constructed during the incumbency of Governor Faustino S. Dy Jr. The new hospital was inaugurated on June 29, 2004, but the actual transfer of personnel and equipment from Primo Gaffud District Hospital at San Fabian to Primo Gaffud District Hospital at Ipil took place on May 16, 2005. On September 13, 2005, the Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Isabela approved and adopted a resolution naming the new hospital as the Echague District Hospital. It is a core referral hospital of the southern Inter-Local Health Zone which includes the municipalities of Echague, Jones, San Agustin, San Isidro, Ramon, Cordon, Dinapigue and Santiago City with a combined population of about 424,000. The population served is not only confined to its catchment areas but also to patients coming from adjacent municipalities of Alicia, Angadanan, San Guillermo, San Mateo and as far as the provinces of Quirino and Ifugao.

The Echague District Hospital is a 25-bed general hospital which is continuously experiencing tremendous influx of patients with a bed occupancy rate of 179.09% in 2017. This indicates the need to upsize the hospital from 25 beds to 50 beds.

In 2016 one Medical Officer III was appointed permanent and before the end of 2017, one of our contractual Medical Officers was appointed as permanent Medical Officer III. Medical Specialists (OB, Surgery, Medicine, Anesthesiology) entered into a MOA with the Provincial Government – Health Care Program to provide specialty services to our patients.





Graph I. Bed Occupancy Rate




The Bed Occupancy Rate (BOR) in 2017 decreased to 179.09% as compared to 204.43% in 2016. This could be attributed to the proliferation of private Birthing Centers and the now functioning Birthing Centers in the Rural Health Units of the different municipalities surrounding the hospital and to the private hospital (Isabela Southern Specialist Hospital Inc.) located just a few kilometers away from the Echague District Hospital. In addition, the Jones Community Medicare Hospital is now upgraded its capacity from ten beds to up to 45 beds.


Graph II. Total Admissions excluding newborn



Graph III. Ten Leading Causes of Morbidity 2017




Graph IV. 5-Year Comparison of Delivery by Normal Spontaneous (NSD)




This graph shows that there is a decrease in the number of normal spontaneous deliveries in the hospital in 2017 as compared to the past four years.

Graph V. Maternal Death Rates




This graph displays that EDH has reached the goal of zero Maternal Death in the past 5 years.

Graph VI. Net Death Rates




This graph has evidently shown that the Net Death Rate in 2017 decreased.

Graph VII. Infant Mortality Rate




Just like in the Maternal Death Rates, we have maintained zero infant mortality for the past 4 years.


Graph VIII. Total Discharges




Graph IX. Total Inpatient Death




Graph X. Average Daily Census




Graph 11. Referrals FROM RHU and other Hospital




Graph XII. Referrals TO other Hospital




Graph XIII. Total OPD Patients Attended




Graph XIV. Total Laboratory Test Performed




Graph XV. Total Laboratory Test Performed




Graph XVI. Total X-RAY Performed




Graph XVII. Blood Transfused to Patients




Graph XVIII. Dental Services: No. of patients attended and examined




Graph XIX. Dental Services (No. of patients who had tooth Extraction)




Graph XX. Total Admission Newborn




Graph XXI. Total Surgical Operations





Graph XXII. Percentage Admission Non Philhealth






Graph XXIII. Percentage Admission Philhealth






Graph XXIV. Recovery Rate

Hospital Facility Improvement

In February 2016, the newly constructed OPD building became operational and the renovation of the main hospital was completed. This project was accomplished through the Health Facility Enhancement Program of the Department of Health. The project included the following:



Our source of water (deep well 9 meters deep) had been repaired and was provided with 2HP submersible pump (from Milagros Albano District Hospital) through the General Services Office and the Provincial Engineering staff of the Provincial Government of Isabela. However, there were times when it's not functional and upon consultation with the engineering staff of the PGU they had recommended for the need to drill a deep well water system 48 meters deep with enclosure. This will be the priority in the next HFEP project of DOH this 2018.

The construction of the hospital Motorpool was started in November 2016 and was finished in June 2017. A covered path walk connecting the OPD building to the main building was also constructed in 2017. A Holding Area at the Emergency Room required by the DOH was installed and the Emergency Room Nurse Station was renovated and improved. Glass doors at the ER Treatment Room, ER glass doors (to the wards), main ER glass doors (entrance) and a corridor glass door were replaced with new ones. These were accomplished through the 2.5 million peso HFEP of the Department of Health.


